PERIL ON THE SEA -PIRACY

Dangers facing seafarers mainly concerned storms and disasters at sea. However a new danger has emerged in the form of piracy.

Initially attacks took place in the vicinity of the Somalia coastline but attacks have now extended to the Gulf of Guinea and into the Mozambique Channel. With the threat of piracy getting closer to South Africa the SA government has deployed a vessel to patrol the coast.

Counselling skills

The Society's response to the danger of piracy was to upgrade training to include specialised trauma counselling skills to chaplains. This now provides a network of care and support for piracy victims.

Not only have many seafarers been cared for, but through the Society's international network, the families of the traumatized seafarers have been visited and taken care of.

In the light of this ongoing situation, increasing emphasis on trauma counselling is included in the Sailors' Society's future plans.

In April 2015 a group of chaplains from ports in South Africa, Ghana, Madagascar, Mozambique and Reunion underwent an intensive trauma counselling course in Durban., thereby giving them added skills to put into practice when counselling seafarers affected by piracy.

Piracy and Crisis Centre

The Sailors' Society is also committed to develop a Piracy and Crisis Centre in Durban to -

Create a plan for ongoing development of chaplains' piracy, crisis and trauma response training
